Guernsey Travel Survey

Quarter 3 2017 Issue date October 2017

The Guernsey Travel Survey shows the number of air and sea passengers, broken down by type, purpose and origin, based upon exit surveys undertaken at the airport and harbour



1.1 Introduction

The Guernsey Travel Survey is based upon exit surveys undertaken at the airport and harbour, with the findings applied to the actual numbers of passengers (provided by the airport and harbour authorities). The purpose of these surveys is to determine the passenger composition of Guernsey's main air and sea routes, along with the number of visiting cruise passengers and visiting yachtsmen. It includes information on length of stay, purpose of visit, accommodation used, country of origin and party size.

It should be noted that the figures in this report do not include inter-Bailiwick travel (Alderney, Sark and Herm). Figures have been rounded to the nearest 50 and therefore may not always add up precisely.

From April 2017 the methodology for data collection was updated. Planning and deployment of interview shifts changed from quarterly to monthly, hence year on year figures are subject to methodological changes and may not be strictly comparable.

1.2 Headlines for Q3 2017

- The total number of departing **passengers** (both visitors and residents) for Q3 2017 was 193,100.
- The total number of departing **visitors** for Q3 2017 was 125,000. The total number of departing **residents** was 67,600 in Q3 2017.
- Of the 125,000 departing visitors in Q3 2017, 55% travelled by air and 45% by sea.
- 8% of visitors travelled for business purposes, 15% were visiting friends or relatives, 59% were leisure visitors staying for at least one night and a further 17% visiting for a day trip.
- The average length of stay for those who stayed at least one night in Q3 2017 was 5.26 nights.
- 61% of visitors during Q3 2017 were from the UK, 10% from France, 4% from Jersey and the remainder from elsewhere.

1.4 Headlines for January to September 2017

- The total number of departing **passengers** (both visitors and residents) for January to September 2017 was 436,450.
- The total number of departing **visitors** for January to September 2017 was 246,250. The total number of departing **residents** was 189,000 in January to September 2017.
- Of the 246,250 departing visitors in January to September 2017, 61% travelled by air and 39% by sea.
- 14% of visitors travelled for business purposes, 17% were visiting friends or relatives, 54% were leisure visitors staying for at least one night and a further 15% visiting for a day trip.
- The average length of stay for those who stayed at least one night in January to September 2017 was 4.82 nights.
- 65% of visitors during January to September 2017 were from the UK, 9% from France, 7% from Jersey and the remainder from elsewhere.

As shown in **Table 2.1.1**, in Q3 2017 there were 119,500 departing passengers by air and 73,650 by sea (these figures include returning visitors). This represents a drop of 1.5% in air passenger numbers and an increase of 1.8% in sea passengers.

Tables 2.1.2 and **2.1.3** show the number of departing residents and departing visitors by mode of transport (except those visitors who were returning to Guernsey after, for example, a day trip elsewhere).

The numbers of departing passengers by type and mode of transport can be seen in **Figure 2.1.1**.

Table 2.1.4 shows the percentages of departing visitors, returning visitors and residents during Q3.

2.2 Total departing passengers January to September

As shown in **Table 2.2.1**, during the period from January to September 2017 there were 297,550 departing passengers by air and 138,950 by sea (these figures include returning visitors). This represents a drop of 4.3% in air passenger numbers and an increase of 4.6% in sea passengers.

Tables 2.2.2 and **2.2.3** show the number of departing residents and departing visitors by mode of transport (except those visitors who were returning to Guernsey after, for example, a day trip elsewhere).

The numbers of departing passengers by type and mode of transport can be seen in **Figure 2.2.1**.

Table 2.2.4 shows the percentages of departingvisitors, returning visitors and residents duringthe period from January to September.

As shown in **Table 2.3.1** and **Table 2.3.2**, in Q3 2017 there were 68,900 departing visitors by air and 56,100 by sea.

This compares with 70,250 by air and 45,000 by sea in Q3 of 2016.

2.4 Departing visitors Q3 - by purpose of visit

Table 2.4.1 shows the number of departing visitors during Q3 2017 broken down by purpose of visit. In Q3 2017 the highest proportion of visitors were staying leisure visitors (59.4%), followed by day leisure visitors (16.7%) and visitors staying with friends or relatives (VFR) (14.6%).

In Q3 2016 the respective percentages were 58.5%, 13.8% and 17.9%.

The total number of day visitors during Q3 was 24,150 in 2017, 19% of total visitors. The equivalent figure in Q3 2016 was 19,200, which was 17% of the total visitors for that period.

The majority of visitors during Q3 2017 were from the UK, as can be seen in **Figure 2.5.1** and **Table 2.5.1**.

Within the "Elsewhere" category, 3% were from Germany, 2.2% from Holland and the remaining 9.1% from other countries.

More people stayed in hotel accommodation than in any other type of accommodation in Q3 2017 (60.2%) (**Table 2.6.1**).

The overall average length of stay was 5.26 nights in Q3 2017.

In total there were 559,150 overnight stays in Q3 2017, of which 426,250 were in commercial accommodation.

In quarter 3 2016 these figures were 515,500 and 386,500, giving increases of 9% and 10% respectively.

As a percentage of overall departing visitors, day visitors comprised 19.3% of the total (Table 2.7.1).

2.8 Previous visits to Guernsey - Q3



Respondents were asked if they had visited Guernsey before and, if so, had they visited on a cruise ship.

In Q3 2017 59.2% of all visitors had been to Guernsey previously.

Of those who had visited previously, 3.7% had visited on a cruise ship.

Since 2014 visitors have been asked how likely they were, on a scale of 1 to 10, to recommend Guernsey to friends and family.

Those giving an answer of 9 or 10 were categorised as "promoters", those giving 7 or 8 were "passives" and those giving 0 to 6 were "detractors" (**Table 3.1.1**). An overall net promoter score (NPS) was found by subtracting the proportion of detractors from the proportion of promoters.

In Q3 2017 the NPS was 53.0.

A breakdown of promoters, passives and detractors is given in **Figure 3.1.1**.

The number of departing residents was 67,600 in Q3 2017.

The majority of departing residents travelled by air (74.3%) as can be seen in **Table 4.1.2**.

5.1 Onward flights

Residents and departing visitors were asked if they were flying onwards after their initial destination airport.

Table 5.1.1 shows that 24% of all passengers were flying on to another airport. 19,000 Guernsey residents (38% of total residents) and 11,850 of departing visitors (16% of total visitors) were flying onwards in the third quarter of 2017.

5.1 Onward flights (continued)

The most popular destinations for onward travel are shown in **Figure 5.1.1**. The highest number of passengers were flying on to the Spanish mainland, followed by airports in Scotland and the Balearics. The most popular destinations for departing visitors were Scotland, Germany and other English airports.

Guernsey Harbours collates information on the number of cruise passengers visiting the island, depicted in **Table 6.1.1** and **Figure 6.1.1**.

In quarter 3 2017, the number of landed passengers was 56,288, compared with 67,880 in quarter 3 2016.

6.2 Visiting yachtsmen

Guernsey Harbours collates information on the number of passengers on pleasure craft visiting the island, depicted in **Table 6.2.1** and **Figure 6.2.1**.

In Q3 2017, the number of yachtsmen was 11,562, compared with 10,580 in Q3 2016.

7.1 Methodology

Surveys are undertaken at Guernsey's airport and harbour to determine the composition of passengers. The results are analysed and applied to the actual numbers of passengers (provided by the airport and harbour authorities). For the smaller routes, cumulative passenger numbers are used, giving more statistically accurate results. The final numbers are rounded to the nearest 50.

The face-to-face interviews are conducted in shifts, covering all routes, days of the week and times of day. The interviewee selection process is as random as possible and targets one person per travelling party.

In April 2017 the interview questionnaire was updated following a move from paper-based, face-to-face interviews to a digital questionnaire. In addition, the move from quarterly to monthly data collection meant that shift patterns were also updated to reflect this.

In Q3 2017 a total of 6,662 interviews were completed, which represented 16,131 passengers. This is 8.4% of the total number of passengers departing Guernsey during Q3 2017 (excluding inter-Bailiwick travel).
