Guernsey Travel Survey

Quarter 1 2019 Issue date April 2019

The Guernsey Travel Survey shows the number of air and sea passengers, broken down by type, purpose and origin, based upon exit surveys undertaken at the airport and harbour



1.1 Introduction

The Guernsey Travel Survey is based upon exit surveys undertaken at the airport and harbour, with the findings applied to the actual numbers of passengers (provided by the airport and harbour authorities). The purpose of these surveys is to determine the passenger composition of Guernsey's main air and sea routes, along with the number of visiting cruise passengers and visiting yachtsmen. It includes information on length of stay, purpose of visit, accommodation used, country of origin and party size.


It should be noted that the figures in this report do not include inter-Bailiwick travel (Alderney, Sark and Herm).

From April 2017 the methodology for data collection was updated. Planning and deployment of interview shifts changed from quarterly to monthly, hence year on year figures are subject to methodological changes and may not be strictly comparable.

1.2 Headlines for Q1 2019

- The total number of departing passengers (both visitors and residents), not including cruise or yacht passengers, for Q1 2019 was 89,416, an increase of 2% when compared with Q1 2018.
- The total number of departing visitors, not including cruise and yacht passengers, for Q1 2019 was 32,007. The total number of departing residents was 57,409 in Q1 2019.
- Of the 32,007 departing visitors in Q1 2019, 84% travelled by air and 16% by sea.
- 23% of visitors stayed for business purposes, 30% were visiting friends or relatives, 24% were leisure visitors staying for at least one night and a further 19% visiting for a day trip.
- The average length of stay for those who stayed at least one night in Q1 2019 was 4.30 nights.
- 71% of visitors during Q1 2019 were from the UK, 3% from France, 16% from Jersey and the remainder from elsewhere.

As shown in **Table 2.1.1**, in Q1 2019 there were 77,289 departing passengers by air and 12,127 by sea (these figures include returning visitors). This represents a 2% increase in air passenger numbers and no real change in sea passengers since Q1 2018.

Tables 2.1.2 and **2.1.3** show the number of departing residents and departing visitors by mode of transport (except those visitors who were returning to Guernsey after, for example, a day trip elsewhere).

Table 2.1.4 shows the percentages of departingvisitors, returning visitors and residents duringQ1.



As shown in **Table 2.2.1** and **Table 2.2.2**, in Q1 2019 there were 26,826 departing visitors by air and 5,180 by sea.

This compares with 25,000 by air and 4,330 by sea in Q1 of 2018.

Figure 2.2.2 shows the longer term trend in departing visitors by mode of transport and clearly demonstrates the seasonal nature of the industry.

2.3 Departing visitors Q1 - by purpose of visit

Table 2.3.1 shows the number of departing visitors during Q1 2019 broken down by purpose of visit. In Q1 2019 the highest proportion of visitors were staying with friends or relatives (VFR) (30%), followed by visitors staying for leisure purposes (24%).


In Q1 2018 the respective percentages were 29%, 21 and 27%.

The total number of day visitors during Q1 was 6,033 in 2019, 19% of total visitors. The equivalent figure in Q1 2018 was 5,346, which was 18% of the total visitors for that period.

Figure 2.3.1 Q1 departing visitors by purpose of visit





Table 2.3.2 shows the number of departing visitors during Q1 2019 broken down by mode of transport and purpose of visit. In Q1 2019 the highest proportion of visitors by air were visitors staying at least one night with friends or family, whereas for visitors travelling by sea, the highest was staying leisure visitors.



2.4 Departing visitors Q1 - by country of residence




Figure 2.4.1 Q1 2019 departing visitors by country of residence

More people stayed in hotel accommodation than in any other type of accommodation in Q1 2019 (58%) (**Table 2.5.1**).

The overall average length of stay was 4.30 nights in Q1 2019.

In total there were 110,805 overnight stays in Q1 2019, of which 53,802 were in commercial accommodation.

In Q1 2018 these figures were 103,442 and 47,232, giving increases of 7% and 14% respectively.

Figure 2.5.1 Average length of stay by accommodation type Q1 2019





The majority of departing visitors on a day trip were travelling by air (83% in Q1 2019).

As a percentage of overall departing visitors, day visitors comprised 19% of the total (Table 2.6.1).

Table 2.6.2 shows that 29% of day visits were forleisure purposes, and 58% for business purposes.

2.7 Previous visits to Guernsey - Q1 2019



Respondents were asked if they had visited Guernsey before and, if so, had they visited on a cruise ship.

In Q1 2019, 79% of all visitors had been to Guernsey previously.

Of those who had visited previously, 2.3% had visited on a cruise ship.




Figure 3.1.1 Q1 2019 breakdown of visitors likely to recommend Guernsey

Since 2014 visitors have been asked how likely they were, on a scale of 1 to 10, to recommend Guernsey to friends and family.

Those giving an answer of 9 or 10 were categorised as "promoters", those giving 7 or 8 were "passives" and those giving 0 to 6 were "detractors" (**Table 3.1.1**). An overall net promoter score (NPS) was found by subtracting the proportion of detractors from the proportion of promoters.

In Q1 2019 the NPS was 52.0. This compares with 41.2 in Q1 2018.

A breakdown of promoters, passives and detractors is given in **Figure 3.1.1**.



The number of departing residents was 57,409 in Q1 2019.

The majority of departing residents travelled by air (88%) as can be seen in **Table 4.1.2**.

5.1 Onward flights

Residents and departing visitors were asked if they were flying onwards after their initial destination airport.

Table 5.1.1 shows that in Q1 2019, 20% of all passengers were flying on to another airport. 12,467 Guernsey residents (25% of total) and 3,205 departing visitors (12% of total) were flying onwards in the first quarter of 2019.



5.1 Onward flights (continued)

The most popular destinations for onward travel are shown in **Figure 5.1.1**. The highest number of passengers were flying on to the Canary Islands, followed by the USA, Scotalnd and ther English airports. The most popular destinations for departing visitors were other English airports, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

6.2 Visiting yachtsmen Q1

Guernsey Harbours collates information on the number of passengers on pleasure craft visiting the island, depicted in **Table 6.2.1** and **Figure 6.2.1**.

In Q1 2019, the number of yachtsmen was 337, compared with 286 in Q1 2018.

Figure 6.2.1 Q1 Visiting yachtsmen



7.1 Methodology

Surveys are undertaken at Guernsey's airport and harbour to determine the composition of passengers. The results are analysed and the resulting percentages are applied to the actual numbers of passengers (provided by the airport and harbour authorities). For the smaller routes, cumulative passenger numbers are used, giving more statistically accurate results.

The face-to-face interviews are conducted in shifts, covering all routes, days of the week and times of day. The interviewee selection process is as random as possible and targets one person per travelling party. The interviews are conducted on a range of days of the week and a range of times of the day, minimising bias.

In April 2017 the interview questionnaire was updated following a move from paper-based, face-to-face interviews to a digital questionnaire. In addition, the move from quarterly to monthly data collection meant that shift patterns were also updated to reflect this.

In Q1 2019 a total of 4,700 interviews were completed, which represented 8,193 passengers. This is 9.1% of the total number of passengers departing Guernsey during Q1 2019 (excluding inter-Bailiwick travel).

All sample surveys are subject to a degree of statistical error. This quarter there were 4,700 interviews conducted and it was found that 35.6% of respondents were departing visitors. With a 95% confidence level, the margin of error is plus/minus 1.4% - in other words, there is a 95% probability that the proportion of departing visitors lies within the range of 34.2% to 37.0%. As the sample sizes decrease (for individual routes, purposes of visit and types of accommodation for example), so the margin of error increases.
