


General conditions for filming in the Islands of Guernsey

Guernsey: you only need permission if traffic were to be stopped for filming purposes. In such case, the Police will need to agree permission. If filming on private land, you must obtain prior permission from the landowner.

For filming in St Peter Port/Harbour area, you'll need permission from the Harbour Master / Assistant Harbour Master. There are some restricted areas which are clearly marked, but most areas are public. They can also advise on particularly good spots for times and tides and where there will be some pretty leisure boats / yachts that are arriving.

Drones: Please be aware there are some restrictions and guidelines for drone filming. You will need a permit from the DCA which can be applied for by emailing drones@cidca.aero or alternatively, use a locally qualified drone pilot.







Food filming

Guernsey has a vast array of beach kiosks at the most beaches, serving up crab filled sandwiches, Guernsey Gauche and locally produced ice-cream, which showcases a snapshot of simple island life and still an integral part of our heritage.


Hedge side fruit and vegetables (locally known as Hedge Veg) is quintessentially Guernsey, in the summer months, boxes are overflowing with the produce from the island's fields and gardens, payment is by honesty box. The farmers market at Sausmarez Manor (every Saturday) is a great place to track down many of the local producers.

Turbot, Bass, Brill, Chancre Spider crabs and lobster it's all here in abundance and so fresh, along with mackerel which is often bought straight from the fishermen as they land their catch (fish availability depends on month).









Ideal locations include:

- Fort Grey maritime museum
- Loop hole (pre-Martello) towers
- German underground hospital
- WWII bunkers, watchtowers and gun casements
- Coastal forts, bunkers and lookouts
- Contact 'Festung Guernsey' organisation who are very knowledgeable and will introduce you to specific sites.



For the best shots of St Peter Port, bays and Island Life, film St Peter Port in the early morning.

Ideal locations include

- Thriving quay beautifully maintained marinas
- Lanes with cobbled streets lined with shops and boutiques
- Business centre with corporate looking buildings
- Rooftop shots into the harbour overlooking the islands
- Back streets with stone steps flanked by granite walls and buildings
- Model Yacht Pond
- Castle Emplacement
- Old Quarters, cobbled street lined with small shops
- Market building
- Al fresco eateries such as The Terrace, Octopus, Dix Neuf, Hideaway & coco
- Clifton & Constitution Steps
- Burt Lane off Mill Street
- Views from Candie Gardens overlooking harbour and neighbouring islands
- Model Yacht Pond and Castle Emplacement
- La Vallette Bathing Pools (recently restored and a favourite for wild swimming)
- Victoria tower





- Islands in the distance (Herm, Sark, Alderney, Jersey, French Coast)
- Busy harbour of St Peter Port, ferry port, fishermen going in and out
- Smaller harbours in Alderney, Sark and Herm
- Big jetty, sea wall, careening hard

- Cruise liners off St Peter Port harbour
- Yachts and dinghies, yacht racing
- Puffins (off Herm)
- Gannet colony off of Alderney

- Looking at St Peter Port town
 – From the top of the Ferry
 Terminal, White Rock
- Looking back over the roof tops of St Peter Port towards
 Castle Cornet from Clifton
- Sandy Beaches Sweeping view of L'Ancresse bay with loophole towers
- Fort Grey & Pleinmont
- Cliff views Icart Point

- Sister Islands Herm and Sark can be filmed in close proximity or in the distances
- Lihou Island is another interesting angle, it is a small tidal island that lies off the West Coast and can only be accessed by a causeway at low tide. Lihou's bird and marine life makes it an important conservation area.

A 35-minute boat ride from St Peter Port, takes you to the unique island of Sark. free of cars, bicycles or horse-drawn carriages are the normal form of transport.

- Causeway to Lihou Island uninhabited island with large Venus pool
